**Speaker: Jo Wilson – Working as an Archaeologist**

Last Thursday we were privileged to hear a talk on archaeology in Australia from Jo Wilson, Jo is the daughter of Paul and Jill Wilson. Following obtaining her qualifications as an archaeologist she has worked full-time in the industry since 2010. Jo holds a Bachelor of Archaeology with Honours and was awarded an AV, AAA, ASHA from Latrobe University as a recognition of her expertise in the field.

In 2015 based on a survey conducted, it was estimated that there were approximately 735 working archaeologists in Australia of which approximately 67% were under 45 years of age. Of this percentage some 51.5% were female. 75% of all archaeologists work on the eastern seaboard predominantly in Victoria and New South Wales in historical work. In Queensland and Western Australia the mining industry dominates with archaeologists working in the indigenous field. In Victoria there are 231 Cultural Heritage managers listed with Aboriginal Victoria, some of these may be from interstate and there may be other historical archaeologists that are listed. In Australia archaeology is split into either indigenous or historical, using the year 1788 as the separation ("first contact") this requires different methodologies to be applied with having to comply with owner has legislation in many cases.

Working on historical sites can be extremely interesting with the discovery of artefacts from both white settlement and earlier indigenous settlement.

Identifying and ageing some of the artefacts found can be extremely difficult, they could be comprised of ancient fire hearths, burnt animal bones, clay balls etc.

On Historical sites can be found old foundations of wooden brick or stone, shards of glass, butchered animal bones metal pins nails personal items etc.

As Jo said in conclusion this was a "super brief overview of Australia archaeology" so much so that even the super brief overview was far too complex to reproduce in this publication.

Jo had obviously gone to a significant amount of trouble to prepare her talk and we were most grateful for her efforts at the very short notice she was given.

President-elect Alan thanked Jo for her talk and presented her with our speakers' gift in appreciation of her efforts.

**Meeting closed at 7.30 pm** and adjourned to the dining room for a meal and fellowship.
