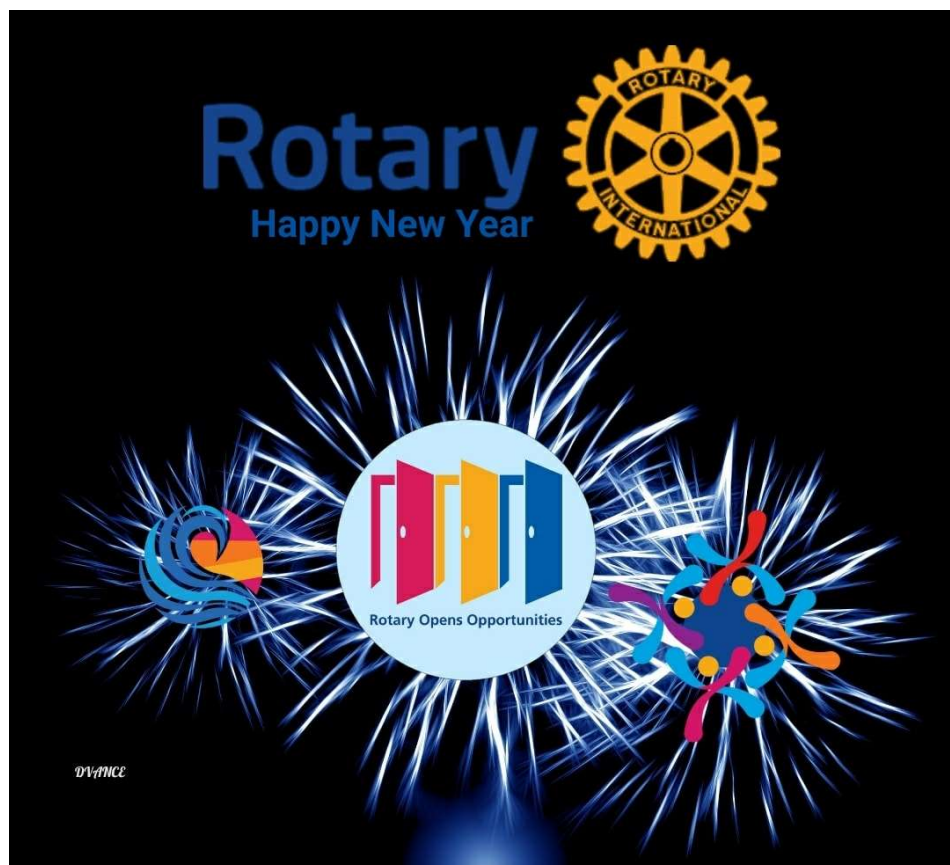

## Bread Tags for Wheelchairs

**FOLLOWING** a Zoom meeting on April 16, when members of the Rotaract Club of Adelaide University, SA, were joined by Aussie Bread Tags for Wheelchairs founder Jenny Cooper, the club set itself the ambitious goal of collecting 200kg of used bread tags over four months.

To put that into perspective, one standard loaf bread bag holds around 2kg of tags, so they estimate they will need to collect five to six plastic garbage bags of tags to reach their target.

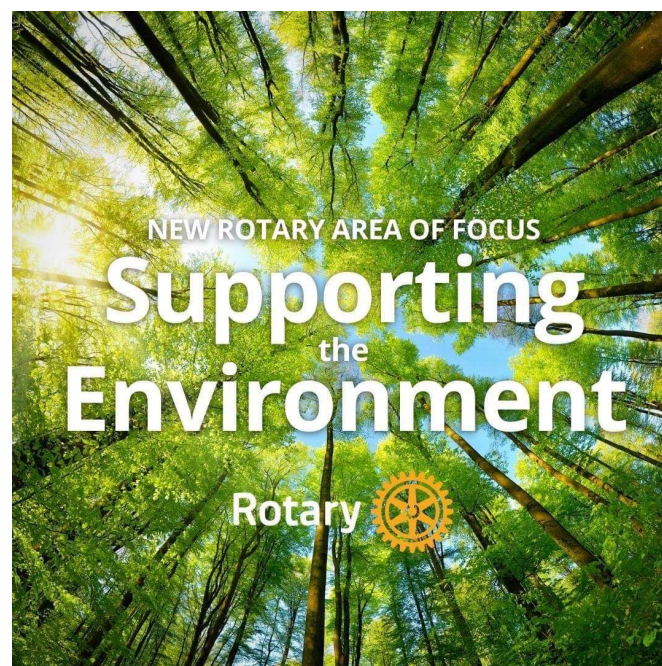
The tags are then sold to thermoplastic recycling company Transmutation, based in the small fishing village of Robe, SA, which makes and sells homewares from the tags. Funds raised from the sale of tags will allow the club to buy a wheelchair for a disabled child in South Africa.

Bread Tags for Wheelchairs has been recycling bread tags in South Africa since 2006, collecting around 500kg each month. Many wheelchairs have been distributed around the country, with the added bonus of keeping tags out of landfill.

Collection in Australia began in September 2018 and there are now more than 350 collection points across the country.

The Rotaract Club of Adelaide University is setting up an impressive network of partners to achieve its target, including university food outlets, school canteens and boarding houses, aged care facilities, cafes and lunch providers, all of which consume multiple loaves of bread a day. Even Rotary Bunnings sausage sizzles use 40-50 loaves a day. The club is also setting up collection points at some of these businesses for customers to donate their tags as well.

# Rotary Safe Families addressing DV and elder abuse

**RECOGNISING** a family violence or elder abuse situation and knowing what role you can safely play to support victims and prevent domestic violence and elder abuse are the aims of Rotary Safe Families, a program of the Rotary Club of Melbourne, Vic, which recently launched two new videos to help inform a wider audience.

With an average of one woman a week being murdered by her current

or former partner in Australia, and current lockdown restrictions making conditions at home worse for many, now is the time for Rotarians to start being part of the solution to end domestic violence, says Rotary Club of Melbourne's Dorothy Gilmour.

"We must not leave this issue of family violence and elder abuse to our police and health care workers. It is our responsibility to at least be aware and able to identify and locate help in these situations," Dorothy said.

"Every day the government is highlighting that police and hospitals are noting the increase of domestic violence. There are so many women and children currently living in dangerous situations with their partner at home or out of work; they have nowhere to go and are scared to leave. This is the time that we all need to be aware of women and children trapped by isolation."

Having worked in trauma, loss and grief counselling, and lecturing on

this topic at university for many years, Dorothy co-led the development of the Rotary Safe Families program with past President Mary Barry, former CEO of Our Watch, and the support of the club's Family Violence Working Committee. Dorothy believes the solution starts with awareness, and that is everyone's responsibility.

"Rotary Safe Families is an awareness program. It's about being informed and knowing what domestic violence looks like and what we can do about it," Dorothy said. "We're all sitting on our hands while this happens in our communities. As Rotarians, we are here to help others; and Rotary Safe Families is here to help you help others."

Originally launched in 2019 as a workshop preventative program, Rotary Safe Families has expanded to include two professional 20-minute videos – one on the topic of family violence and one on elder abuse –

to make it easier for Rotarians both Australia-wide and internationally to access the preventative program. Already accessible online, the program has had international interest from Uganda, Tanzania and the UK.

"The videos show everyday examples of family violence and elder abuse and what the bystander can do. That includes identifying violence and elder abuse, being informed as to how to have communication with a victim or someone in danger of becoming a victim and, most importantly, being capable of finding appropriate referral support for the victim," Dorothy said.

The Rotary Safe Families program is a Rotary100DownUnder initiative and is available for all Rotary clubs to screen for their members. The videos are supported by the program's manual and toolkit, which are also available online.
