President's announcements:

International: (PP Paul Mc Aloney) Chairman Paul cleared up the issue surrounding what was the budget agreed for the 2019/2020 Rotary year for the International committee. The amounts were \$11,000 for projects and \$2,000 for emergencies.

Fellowship: The 1812 Theatre in Upper Ferntree Gully has a new season starting, the play being "On Golden Pond" which will commence on 20th February and ending on 14th March. A number of members indicated their interest in attending so please watch this space for further announcements. PP Mike Spark reminded members that the Sunday Jazz afternoons are still ongoing at the Royal Hotel in Upper Ferntree Gully, there was some discussion around the dates, one being Sunday 15th March the other being Sunday, 21st March, these to be confirmed. The next appearances by the band will be in May.

Youth: (Rtn Paul Wilson.): Paul is seeking assistance with this committee, it would appear to be one of the most active in the club at present, he is finding it very onerous to carry out all of the commitments required on his own. He is requesting assistance from another club member.

PROGRAM: Our guest speakers for the evening Ellen Ramsay and Stephane Nankoo from the **Knox Council's Arts & Cultural Services – Festivals and Events Team** gave us a very good run down on what's required to stage community events in Knox.

Some of the festivals that they oversee are the 'Stringy Bark Festival', 'Carols by Candlelight', Knox Festival, Seniors Festival, etc- these Being just a few.

It became very clear that these events do not occur without significant amount of planning going on behind-the-scenes, whether by the events team or by community groups wishing to run some sort of a public function. It's important when planning any sort of function that is going to involve anything up to 500 people or more to consult with the Council to ensure the guidelines are followed.

There is an Events Guide available from the council that sets out step-by-step the processes involved in planning any sort of community function, important steps such as programming, dates and locations so that you don't clash with other planned functions, logistics and site design, compliance with local planning laws and so on. It's also important to determine what permits may be required to comply with community laws.

To assist with all the requirements, in addition to documentation there is an **Event Kit** available from the council that contains many useful items.

President Allan thanked the speakers and presented both with the pen/usb stick.


