President DON might make his living from mending the results of road crashes but, perhaps because of all the tangled metal he sees, he is acutely aware of need for a tougher approach to road safety. He has contributed the article below - with acknowledgment to Rydge's magazine:

Now for a little real toughness on road deaths

One of the less pleasing aspects of the economic recovery is the corresponding rise in road deaths. The increase in traffic densities has unfortunately coincided with a decline in the impact of random breath testing laws in our most populous states. These factors coupled with the sorry state of our roads and poor driver education and attitudes are causing us to kill our young people on the roads at an alarming rate.

Governments of various kinds have made well-meaning attempts to do something about road deaths. Introduction of breath testing in some states is a useful government contribution to solution of the problem. But it remains at best only a partial answer and no government has come to grips with the problem in a satisfactorily tough-minded way. Perhaps the real horror of motoring fatalities are only felt when members of one's own family are involved; otherwise the figures on accidents remain arid, if somewhat frightening, statistics.

Apart from the terrible family tragedies that are caused, the economic

cost of these deaths are enormous. Typically road accident victims are under 25 years of age and have not had much opportunity to make an economic contribution or to provide a return on the community's investment in their education.

The heartbreak caused families is immeasurable and no longer can the community let the killing of young folk go on without making vigorous efforts to identify the causes of accidents and doing something about stopping them. Many people and institutions are at fault as are some community attitudes and values. So far Governments have only fiddled with the problem. It is now time to get serious despite the inevitable squeals from vested interests.

Even though they are driven by full-time professionals, heavy trucks are involved in too high a proportion of road deaths. It should not be thought that large trucks are the only or even the principal cause of road deaths. The whole community, each one of us, is at fault.

NB:

This is a **list of motor vehicle deaths in Australia by year.**

It shows the *annual* number of road fatalities (road deaths) *per capita per year*, in the year the data was collected. The list includes all road users such as drivers, passengers, pedestrians, motorcyclists and cyclists.

Importance of keeping Rotary Down Under database up to date

With the changing of board members each year there seems to be some confusion over what databases need updating and where this can be done.

This letter is sent out twice a year to remind members that the Rotary Down Under (RDU) database runs separately from the Rotary International (RI) and District databases. This means that membership and address changes made to the RI database and District databases also need to be made to the RDU database.

Members can be added, removed or updated on the RDU database at any time of the year. Members that are added after RDU invoices are issued will be charged a pro-rata amount.

As it is mandatory for all members of Rotary to subscribe to an official Rotary publication, please ensure all current members are subscribing to a magazine.

The only exceptions are:

- 1) it is not mandatory for honorary members to subscribe (this is up to each individual club to decide as the magazine cost is charged to the club)
- 2) two Rotarians residing at the same address may subscribe jointly to an official magazine.

At RDU we allow 4 officers per club to have access to view and update club and member details each year. These officers are President, Secretary, Treasurer and Database Manager. Once notification is received from the club advising RDU of the names of these officers, access can be given from July 1 – June 30 and is easily reactivated for reoccurring positions. Current club officers can also activate this access in advance for incoming officers.

RDU invoices twice a year – June and December – for January-June and July-December. This allows time for clubs to ensure their subscription list is correct on our database. We allow a couple of weeks after invoices are sent out for adjustments to be made.

If your club already knows the members who will be holding these positions for the next Rotary year, please feel free to access our database and update these details:

Click My Club Details tab – at top right of screen. **Click My Club Officials** from the drop down box. **Click Create** to add new club officials. Enter details including club role and relevant dates. The start date will automatically be added as the day you add the club official however you will need to add the end date – 30/06/2021
Click Submit to save.

To log in:

1. Go to www.rotarydownunder.com.au
2. Click on Subscription Management Login on left hand side of our home page
Or go directly to <https://database.rotarydownunder.com.au/members/>
3. Enter your username (RDU ID) and password.

To see a **full list** of subscribers for your club **click the club member tab** at the top right.

To **delete** a member **click arrow** on the **right of the members name** and **click delete**.

To **add** a member **click Create** button at **top right** of list – and **add details. Submit to save**.

Should any members not have an email address, or prefer not to have it recorded, please use none@none.com

Any officers that are unaware of their Username (RDU ID) and password can contact me directly and I will issue these details to them.

If you experience difficulties with our database, please don't hesitate to contact us for assistance.

For any officers that are not comfortable with updating our database online, you are always welcome to contact me and I can send you a spreadsheet of members that you can correct and send back to me for updating.

Each month RDU receives numerous magazines returned due to incorrect or out of date delivery details. For each of these returned magazines Australia Post charges us \$2.00. To ensure RDU subscription fees are kept to a minimum, please keep all addresses current.

If you require assistance with updating the RDU database, please don't hesitate to contact me via email as RDU staff are currently working out of the office.

Change to subscription rates **Effective 1 July 2020**

Dear Secretary:

From 1 July 2020 there will be changes to the magazine subscription prices. The last time there was an increase was in 2012 and since then many components involved with the creation and delivery of the magazine have increased in cost such as design, printing and postage.

New rates:

Hard copy magazine currently \$40 per year will increase to \$44 (\$22 per half year)

Digital copy magazine currently \$40 per year will decrease to \$34 (\$17 per half year)

Clubs will be invoiced in June and December for the number of subscribers in our database and we request that whatever the chosen delivery method for each subscriber is at the time of invoicing, remains in place for that 6-monthly period.

Please take the time to discuss these options with your members, to allow time for all changes to be made by 1st June 2020 before invoicing is processed.
