Announcements:

The President welcomed Joan and Malcolm C (District 9810) as well as the **Speaker** – Ray Peace (of the Knox Historical Society) who started his presentation about the **History of the 1812 Theatre** with some interesting events and changes since the Theatre was established in Rowville on the corner of Kelletts Road and Napoleon Road (hence the 1812 name) in the early 20th century. The original hall venue was totally destroyed by fire, and the society literally arose from the ashes with no assets but willing members. After a few years, they were able to buy the current building and turn it into a proper theatre – and later on, buy the Bakery next door and integrate that into the existing 2-theatre complex of which we are regular audience members.

The society was run by a couple of strong artistic people in the early years and went from strength to strength, currently being a rare organisation that owns its own venue and has a large membership list.

Programmes are many and varied, and particularly good at comedy (in my experience, anyway), but also excellent in the dramatic areas.

Ray (as usual) presented his research very well and held our interest completely. He gave us many valuable insights into the diverse (and at times incendiary) relationships of the major players throughout the 1812's history, and answered questions after his talk and over dinner after the meeting

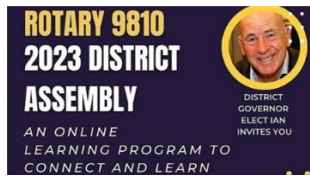
Members are reminded that we need a RYLA participant, or sponsor a Leader if we cannot find a suitable club candidate.


