Scribes Report from Dinner Meeting

Thursday May 19th

The meeting opened at 6.25pm.

Present-G. Aspinall, C Anderson, A.Tierney, B and F Mandergeddes (by zoom), G Harrison, J Flemming, P Wilson, P McAloney, R Hurst, M Spark, R Massey. In addition to these members also present were Mrs K McAloney, Mrs M Hurst, Mrs J Wilson and Mrs S Harrison.

Christine raised the matter of the club's support for the upcoming Red Shield Appeal and drew up a roster for Friday and Saturday 27 and 28 May. The venue being Woolworths Mountain Gate. Rosie spoke of the appeal and emphasised that all proceeds will be spent in the FTG region. She said that we should emphasise this when collecting.

Rob Hurst asked that all members should try to identify some speakers as he had few booked.

Graeme A. and Brian said that they had some.

Fran urged members to register for the district assembly as it helps with recognition of the club. Christine supported that call.

Paul McAloney reported on a social night at Frankston Arts Centre with the Robinson Brothers and said that it was a really good show. (following dinner at a local hotel). Paul also indicated that he had booked for 17 for the 1812 Theatre play on Friday 3 June and for dinner at the Royal Hotel.

Christine reported on the Thank You function for the Ferntree Gully News and said that it provided a good opportunity to network with local bodies.

Brian reported that he had sent \$500 to Rotary Foundation for Polio Plus and \$900 for club dues. He was also forwarding \$200 to Bayswater for their assistance with a recent sausage sizzle at which we grossed \$770 (NETT \$622).

Graeme A referred to the upcoming World Environment Day on 4 June and said that a Queens Jubilee Grant had resulted in 4000 plants being purchased for planting on the Dandenong Creek on 4 said that members should give consideration to assisting on 4 June. The site is at the end of Armstrong Rd. Bayswater. Graeme then presented Paul McAloney with his Centurian certificate and referred to the extremely high representation of club members as Centurians.

The speaker for the meeting was Megan Baker councillor for Dobson ward in the City of Knox Council.

Megan spoke on the diverse nature of the makeup of the ward, the fact that she had become involved in community matters when her children attended a local school and how her position had enabled her to assist local bodies in areas such as gaining grants. She also referred to the myriad meetings she was required to attend and for which she had to prepare by studying minutes etc. She emphasised that when being requested to act for constituents she was however required to be open minded.

A new Local Government Act in 2020 had been long and tedious to study she said but it had been essential to do so as there are penalties set out in the Act that ensure that she has to be careful in wording responses as there are consequences. Megan emphasised that Councillors have little involvement in staff matters as their only real administrative action is to review the performance of the CEO.

She said that she has had to carefully balance her time between family and Council also with time on-line and with phone calls.

Members put a number of questions to Megan on matters such as fees for owning pools, if council intended reviving its volunteers cocktail parties, planning and the best way to approach Council to get results or responses, also the extent of usage of consultants by Council and the future of the Boronia basketball stadium.

Rob Hurst thanked Megan for her attendance after a number of "false starts".

Response to questions raised with our guest speaker Megan

I have followed up on a couple of queries raised by rotary members with council officers and provide a response below to the query about pool costs and ward meetings.

In relation to pool costs:

- * There aren't annual requirements or costs Pool and Spa compliance, with pools/spas there is the registration, then the inspection, the issuing of the Certificate of Barrier Compliance and then pool/spa owners are done for the moment. Another inspection and Certificate of Barrier Compliance needs to be done every 4 years. If a there is a compliance problem that requires a resolution, it may incur infringements or other fees may be applied.

Where: Dandenong Creek - at the end of Armstrong Street, Bayswater


Parking: Park in Armstrong Street, Bayswater and follow the signs along the shared path down to the creek.
