Hope everyone is well and enjoying the cooler weather.


I don't have a lot to say , as Nadia and I spent last week with our legal team followed by mediation on Friday. It went as we all expected , with a result of zero so its off to court .



Guests-Gavin & Dianne McIntyre from ROMAC (Rotary Oceania Medical Aid for Children)

President Elect Graeme A, did the Toast to Rotary & Australia.

Gavin introduced himself and his association with ROMAC and then showed a short video on the working of ROMAC and results with the children who have had the chance to be helped in the past.

ROMAC. give beds to children where they can be obtained in Australian & New Zealand hospitals, The surgery is undertaken on a pro bono basis by the surgeons

The organization has been operating for 30 years and is also voluntary with no employees or office

Their first patient was from Fiji and to date 537 children under the age of 15 from Oceania have been treated for various issues of major problems

The cost of travel, accommodation and medical costs are met by ROMAC and other organisations like Ronald Mc Donald Houses.

Their most famous patients were 2 Conjoint Twins who were joined at the chest and as the result of the surgery undertaken they now live normal lives.

Outreach Clinics on Oceania give referrals for initial medical help of major issues with children on these islands

Dianne then told and showed stories of individual cases and how they are helped with schooling and other non- medical issues resulting on these patients on to university etc and helping give back to their home islands.

Private Hospitals are now helping St Vincents, Canberra, St John of God to name a few due to lack of beds in the public system.

Currently 65 approved cases have been held due to red on medical Visas,

Cancer Patients are having difficulty in going on the programme due the inability to have follow up programmes on the home islands.

A number of questions were tabled and answered.

Graeme Aspinall gave a vote thanks on behalf of the meeting.

Treasurer Brian Mandergeddes gave a quick update., Profit on Bunnings BBQ approx.S730

Grant from Bendigo Bank \$1200 for Anzac Day is being used to purchase equipment required for the Service.

Rob Hurst reminded all about next week's meeting at the Brewery or assisting at Bunnings Night.

MAKE MEETINGS MEANINGFUL

What role do our Club meetings play in attracting, engaging and retaining members?

As Rotarians or Rotaractors, one of the enjoyable parts of our membership is the opportunity to get together with our fellow members. For many of us, most of these opportunities come through our regular club meetings.

But is your club meeting actually enjoyable? Are your meetings meaningful and relevant? Or do you find them a waste of your time?

To make our meetings meaningful, we need to ask:

- **Why do we meet?**
- **Where and when do we meet?**
- **What do we do when we meet?**
- **Who do we meet with?**

Given that ours is a membership organisation, attracting, engaging and retaining our members is key if we want to keep “doing good” in our communities. If you were a prospective member visiting your club for the first time, would you want to come back again?

What connotations come into mind with the word “meeting”? Maybe we need to think of another name for our “get togethers”? Just inviting someone to a “meeting” may be a turn-off.

Instead of a club meeting recently, the Rotary Club of Cairns West, District 9560, cooked and packaged 160 meals which were distributed to people north of Cairns impacted by the December 2023 floods.

With our changing and busy world, and people’s varied time commitments, the need to make meetings meaningful and worthwhile is becoming more important than ever.

So ...

- What opportunities do your club meetings provide for members?
- What should your club consider when planning and scheduling meetings, to meet the needs of your members? Have you asked them lately?
- What role do club meetings play in achieving the goals of your club?
- Do different cohorts in your club (e.g. new vs long term, young vs older, business owners vs others, retired vs working) have different expectations of your meetings? How can you cater for these differences?
- What image of your meetings is portrayed to others outside your club? Do you post photos of your meetings on social media? Do your photos make your meetings look appealing to “outsiders”?

There are a lot of questions here, but not too many answers. That is because it is only you and your club that can provide the answers. If you want to grow Rotary, now is as good a time as any to reflect on your practices to ensure your meetings are meaningful and reflect what you are hoping to achieve as a club. Don’t be afraid to change – dare to be different – but don’t forget the fun!
