The Week That Was 21.9.2023

President Gary Braddock opened the meeting at 6.30 pm

Opening of meeting and welcome

President Gary welcomed members and guests, especially guest speakers, Glenda and Arnold Chivers from the Vintage Drivers Club.

Guest speaker

Glenda Chivers spoke for about 30 minutes on the Vintage Car Club and vintage cars, also presenting many fine photographs, and Glenda and Arnold then answered many questions from members (reported separately in this bulletin). The information they provided was very interesting and well presented. John Flemming in proposing the vote of thanks commented that this was the first time in all his years in Rotary that cars (a great interest of John's) were the subject for the guest speaker. The vote of thanks was enthusiastically supported by the gathering.

Reports

President Gary expressed his regret that he had been unable to attend the recent Rotary clubs' Presidents meeting owing to a health issue and thanks Brian for attending;

Treasurer Brian delivered a brief treasurer's report.

He also summarised the Presidents' meeting, mentioning that we could expect progressive announcements about proposed changes emerging from the restructuring of Rotary. Other matters arising from this meeting were:

Changing structures were likely to lead to clubs more often working co-operatively on joint projects (similar to the Nocturnals model), and Rotary clubs in Australia being able to conduct larger and more ambitious projects. Clubs in Australia would be able to "speak with one voice" in negotiations with governments and non-government organisations (e.g. in seeking funding for initiatives from philanthropists and other funding bodies.) This would encourage "thinking big".

It was intended that My Rotary and Club Runner would be integrated with Club Runner to be the main communication link.

In many of the longer-standing Rotary nations, there had been a trend in recent years for membership decline, around 25% in the last ten years. More flexible regions and more collaboration were seen as appropriate responses to address this trend.

Some club or cluster groupings might be based on face-to-face, others electronic. Some groupings may have greater emphasis on local community projects, others concentrating on international work.

There would shortly be regional elections and a number of surveys – further information to come.

An international projects database was also to be created, with links and information on contacts.

Fund-raising

Graeme Aspinall advised that the latest Sausage Sizzle had made about \$846 profit.

Graeme advised that Bunnings had offered Saturday 23 December for the club's Sausage Sizzle and members agreed to take this up even though so close to Christmas.

Community Chair

Christine reported on the Knox Nocturnals project, which now had 35 people registered and had been enthusiastically received by attendees. Indications are that the program is achieving its aims in providing meaningful activities for youth and contributing to a better and safer community.

Youth workers and volunteers had all done an excellent job. Christine reported that the steering group were now working on ways to fund the continuation of the program in Knox from July 2024 onwards. The grant used for the current program would not be available for later years so alternative funding (perhaps from funding organisations or philanthropists) must be obtained to enable continuation of the program. There would be a busy time until year-end including Stringybark Festival (Sunday 15 October), CFA Open Day (Saturday 25 November), Bunnings Sizzle and Craft night (Thursday 7 December), Ambleside (Sizzle and Craft) in daytime this year (Saturday 9 December).

Con't

Foothills' Steve Barrington is to visit Nepal and go to Everest Base Camp, part of a fund-raising effort. It was agreed that the club would make a donation, the amount to be decided at the next meeting.

Youth Chair

Paul raised for discussion the future relationship with Fairhills High School which, unfortunately, had been unresponsive to approaches to run further Rotary educational programs. It was concluded that the club would be better to redirect its efforts to other local schools such as St Josephs.

Paul and Jill had offered already to host the club's Christmas Party and this has now been set down for Tuesday 19 December.

International Chair

Martin reported that he had attended the International and Foundation Professional Development Seminar. His findings somewhat replicated the sort of information that Brian had already reported on.

Close of meeting

President Gary closed the meeting at 7.35pm. Members and our guests adjourned to the dining room.

Guest speakers Glenda and Arnold Chivers

Topic – Vintage Drivers Club (VDC)

Glenda and Arnold gave a brief history of the club and its growth from being founded in 1958 as a club (at first for Morris car owners and initially in Toorak). Through years of good financial management the club fully owns its own clubrooms in Norcal Road, Nunawading. It grew to 1400 members by 1970. Since then separate clubs have been established in other parts of Victoria such as Ballarat and Bendigo, and the present VDC membership is 539.

An aim of the club is to get out into the Victorian countryside, often for tours by groups of drivers going for about ten days. The cars generate much interest wherever they go. Every two years there is a 1000 Km rally. Ballarat attracted an estimated \$950,000 to local business when a car rally was centred there.

Glenda explained that veteran cars are those made before 1913 and vintage cars were made from 1913 to 31 December 1930. Many roads were unsealed when these cars were built and many had solid tyres. Terms of their insurance or registration inhibit commercial use of the vintage cars. The club is trying to attract younger members. On-road drivers must be over 21 for insurance reasons.

The club liaises closely with RACV and VicRoads. There are Safety check officers to ensure safe usage.

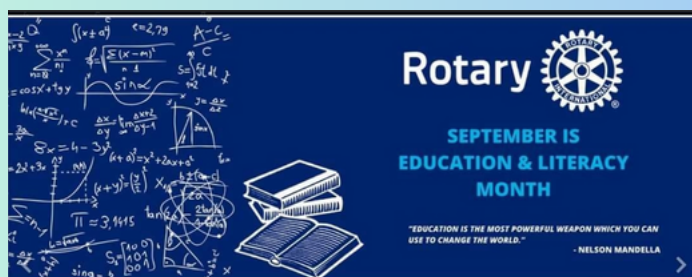
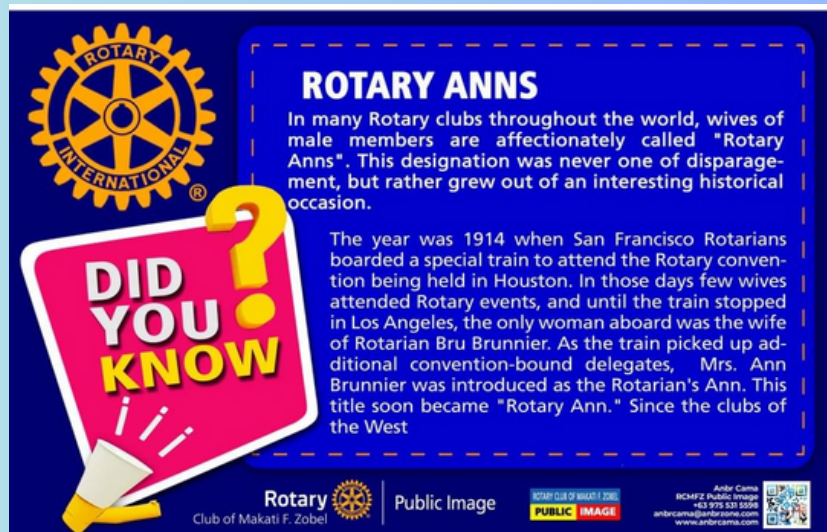
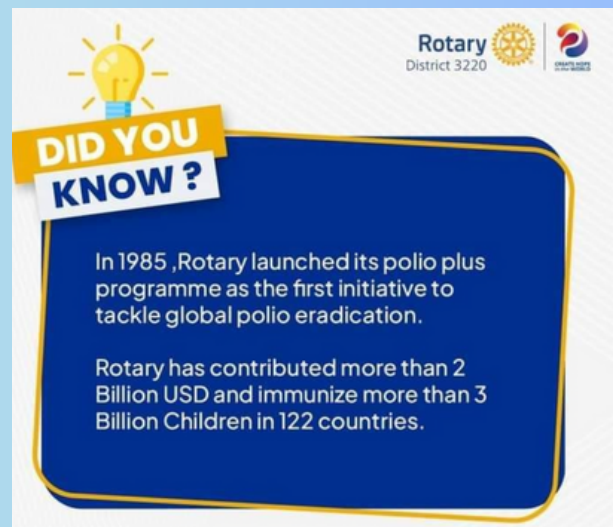
