The Week That Was

The meeting opened at 6.35pm.

President Gary welcomed the visitors and advised that Christine, Allan and Graeme were at a Knox Council awards night. he introduced Gail White who was to speak on the subject-Family Connections-Exploring Family History

Gail said that she had been involved in genealogical history for many years particularly in the tracing of her family's. She said that her three times grandmother Mary was of Cornish/German extraction, was born in 1805, died 1888 and was married to Thomas Paynter in 1823. They embarked from Cork in September 1841 for Australia on a ship called the Bodington with their five children under an assisted passage from the stockbroker JB. Also travelling on the boat was Edward Bristow. In the course of the trip, Mary had another child who they named Charles Bodington Paynter. Mary subsequently had two more children in 1845 and 1847.

Gail said that she had been puzzled to see that on a birth certificate only four children had been shown yet she was aware that there were three others. She found that Mary and Thomas had separated after twenty years and that the other three children were registered as Bristows. Gail said that Edward Bristow set up a shoemaking business in Warrnambool. When Mary died at Allansford in in 1886 the seven children were recorded on the death certificate. Gail found that there were many tragic and early deaths in the Bristow wider family and only three of her children outlived Mary.

Gail then turned to advising of the steps to take to research family history and the various resources available. She said that the FHC is situated in Blackburn near Blackburn station and that they have many records. Gail emphasised that searching the family tree is expensive and she likened it to a hobby. She said that certificates, which really must be obtained cost \$22.50 whilst English ones cost approx \$15.

She indicated that the internet has many state based records and is a wonderful tool also that Trove is a great source of information.

Referring to the FHC, Gail said that membership costs \$125 per year but that in July a half yearly membership will be available. She also said that casual use of the resource costs \$10 for a morning or \$20 for a day. She said however that not all records have been digitised and that Trove money has dried up so that many newspapers have not yet been digitised. She commented that in Britain all newspapers have now been digitised. Martin thanked Gail on behalf of the Club.
