The Rotary Foundation Money Flow

The Rotary Foundation, through its grant programs, funds projects to fulfill the mission of the Foundation. In order to do this, it must raise funds. But what happens to your contribution once it is made?

When a Club or individual makes a contribution to the Foundation, they get to choose the Fund into which it is made and, ultimately, they will have a say in how it is spent. All contributions to the Polio Plus and Disaster Response Funds go directly in grants to support their projects and programs. Share Money Flow

When a contribution is made to the Annual Fund, it is invested for a period of up to three years before it is made available through grants. The earlier a contribution is made in a Rotary year, the more it will earn from that investment.

At the end of every Rotary year, contributions directed to the Annual Fund-SHARE from all the clubs in the district are divided between the World Fund and the District Designated Fund (DDF), after 5% is deducted for operating expenses, with 2.5% coming from each of the amounts available in the two Funds.


This means that for every \$100 given, \$5 is deducted for operating expenses. \$47.50 will go to the World fund and \$47.50 will go to the DDF. Accordingly, 95% of contributions made is available for projects.

When a project is run, on average across all projects, about 7% of the project money is used for administrative related expenses.

Thus, 5% of contributed funds are deducted for operating expenses and 7% of expenditure is used for administration expenses, a total of 12%. Put another way, 88% of money given to the Foundation ends up directly impacting the beneficiaries.

Breakdown

Contributions to the Endowment Fund are invested with earnings being shared between the DDF and the World Fund.
